10 simple tips to do around your home that will make you proud, your neighbors happy and might even put some money in everyone's pockets!

- 1. Pick up the litter! This is a great chore than can be turned into a fun game with young children. They can be part of an activity that's both fun AND great for the environment. This also helps to keep the neighborhood clean and the roadside drainages free of clogging litter and debris.
- 2. **Keep your culverts and storm drains open and clear of debris and obstructions** – it is your deeded obligation and prevents flooding!
- Cut your grass, pull weeds and tend your landscape. Nothing makes for more curb appeal then a house that looks like it's taken care of.
- If you think it may be time to **paint the house** it probably is! A faded, peeling house brings down the whole neighborhood!
- Loose shutters, porch railings, trim boards, etc should all be repaired. If you don't have time to repair them right now, take them down and store them in the garage or shed. Don't store "junk" out front.
- Inoperable, disassembled and wrecked vehicles on your lots are unsightly and against the rules. If you plan to keep them; place them in the garage. Better yet, donate them! Good deeds are a great investment!
- Construction debris belongs in the dump not your yard don't let your yard look like a 7. dump!
- 8. Broken toys, furniture, yard decorations, tires and old appliances – it's time – get rid of them!
- Christmas lights look great in December but not in July take them down! 9.
- 10. Store garbage and recycling containers in a secured area such as the garage or a shed – take them in promptly when emptied.

Have a Safe Halloween

Trick or Treat hours Monday, Oct. 31st 5pm - 8pm

Halloween is a kid's delight. It's a blast to dress up in costumes, go trick-or-treating, attend parties and, most of all; eat candy.

At the same time, Halloween can be scary for parents. Costumes can be dangerous, too much candy can be sickening and walking around at night can be risky.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention offer these tips (in anagram form) to make sure your little ghouls and goblins have a safe Halloween:

- S Swords, knives and similar costume accessories should be short, soft and flexible.
- A Avoid trick-or-treating alone. Children should walk in groups or with a trusted adult.
- F Fasten reflective tape to costumes and bags to help drivers see trick-or-treaters.
- E Examine all treats for choking hazards and tampering before they're eaten.
- H Hold a flashlight while trick-or-treating to help see and help others see you.
- A Always test make-up in a small area first. Remove it when done to avoid skin irritation.
- L Look both ways before crossing the street. Use established crosswalks wherever possible.
- L Lower the risk for serious eye injury by avoiding decorative contact lenses.
- O Only walk on sidewalks or on the far edge of the road facing traffic to stay safe.
- W Wear well-fitting masks, costumes and shoes to avoid blocked vision, trips and falls.
- E Eat only factory-wrapped candy. Avoid eating homemade treats unless you know the cook.
- E Enter homes only if you're with a trusted adult.
- N Never walk near lit candles or other open flames. Be sure to wear flame-resistant costumes.

If you're hosting a party or expecting trick-or-treaters:

- Provide healthy treats, such as individual packs of raisins, trail mix or pretzels. Offer fruits, vegetables and cheeses to party guests.
- Use party games and trick-or-treating as an opportunity for kids to get their daily dose of 60 minutes of physical activity.
- Be sure walking areas and stairs are well-lit and free of obstacles that could cause falls.
- Keep candle-lit jack-o-lanterns and other open flames away from doorsteps, walkways, landings and curtains. Place them on sturdy tables, keep them out of reach of pets and small children and never leave them unattended.
- Drive safely and watch out for trick-or-treaters.

PENNSYLVANIA'S SCHOOL BUS STOPPING LAW

Keeping Children Safe

PENNSYLVANIA'S SCHOOL BUS STOPPING LAW

- When you meet or overtake a stopped school bus with red signal lights flashing and stop arm extended, you MUST STOP.
- When you approach an intersection where a school bus is stopped with red signal lights flashing and stop arm extended, you MUST STOP.
- You MUST STOP at least ten (10) feet away from the school bus.
- You MUST WAIT until the red lights have stopped flashing and the stop arm has been withdrawn before moving.
- ◆ DO NOT MOVE until all the children have reached a place of safety.

KNOW YOUR RESPONSIBILITIES

- ♦ 1.5 million children are transported on Pennsylvania roads each day.
- ♦ These children are transported more than 400 million miles to school each year.
- ◆ Every year, children are needlessly injured or killed by drivers passing stopped school buses.



You MUST STOP on roadways with painted lines.



You MUST STOP at an intersection, whether it is or is not marked with a stop sign.
All traffic MUST stop.



You MUST STOP on roadways with ridged/grooved dividers.

SCHOOL BUS STOPPING LAW

PENALTIES

If you are convicted of violating Pennsylvania's School Bus Stopping Law, you will receive all of the following penalties:


- ♦ 60-Day Driver's License Suspension
- Five (5) points on your driving record
- ♦ \$250 Fine

Annually, over 1,000 motorists do not obey the School Bus Stopping Law.

SEPARATE ROADWAYS

Drivers may proceed on a highway with clearly defined dividing sections or physical barriers providing separate roadways. This only applies when the school bus is on the opposite side of the road.

If In Doubt, STOP!



Physical barriers include concrete median barriers, metal median barriers, guide rails, etc.



Clearly indicated dividing sections include trees or shrubs, rocks or boulders, a stream, grass, etc.
